- 1. **Call to Order:** At 2:08 P.M., meeting called to order by S. Powers.
- 2. **Approval of the September 27, 2023, minutes**: After a motion by P. Jaijairam seconded by J. Watson, the minutes from 09/27/23 were approved unanimously by the 15 voting members present.
- 3. **Appeals report:** S. Powers noted appeals have slowed down considerably, but that will change after the readmit event on 10/26.
- 4. Valedictorian/Salutatorian Selection: (see agenda and proposal) Members were asked to report from their departments. T. Fisher noted that her department was in approval as long as the time for students to respond to the honor was clarified. A. Ott suggested an edit that students will have one week to respond, which was met with approval. R. Allen, N. Phillip, and P. Jaijairam brought questions and concerns from their departments. Discussion ensued. T. Fisher suggested focusing on the current proposal and saving new changes for a future iteration of the proposal. T. Fisher moved to vote on the proposed policy changes with the revision, seconded by O. Melendez. The vote passed unanimously. S. Powers asked for members for a new committee to review the policy and will send out an email about it.
- 5. **Statute of Limitations:** (see agenda) Members were asked to report from their departments. J. Heller noted her department suggested 5 years instead of 7 years. Discussion ensued. The proposal was amended to 5 years instead of 7 years. A. Rivers made a motion to vote to approve the revised proposal, L. Cummins seconded it. The vote passed unanimously.
- 6. **Grade Appeal Process:** (see agenda) The conversation is still tabled.
- 7. **New Business:** A. Rivers reminded members of the Reconnect registration event on 10/26.
- 8. **Adjournment**: After a motion from P. Jaijairam seconded by S. Powers, the meeting adjourned at 2:45pm.

Eligible to be the Val/Sal? At the moment, the answer is 'yes.'

6.C To the Val/Sal discussion, I'd like to also raise the following issue:

Inclusion of Summer graduates in Val/Sal consideration.

As you know, we currently include Summer grads, Fall grads, Winter grads, and anticipated Spring/June grads in the Val/Sal selection. This leads to summer grads from the previous year sometimes being the Val or Sal for the current year (as it is this June for Val). This can seem odd or jarring, as sometimes this person has gone through ceremonies in the previous June, but has now become Val/Sal in the following June. Additionally, sometimes these students have already completed a year of studies at another college.

The most likely solutions to address this issue also have complications:

- Include likely summer grads in Val/Sal consideration for the same year.
- Exclude all summer grads from participating in ceremonies for the same year. (Currently students can participate in ceremonies if they have only one course outstanding and are enrolled in a summer section of the course.)
- Exclude summer grads from any Val/Sal consideration entirely

Revision: To modify the selection process used to determine the valedictorian and salutatorian by amending the objective criteria to address associate degree versus certificate program as well as explore questions regarding courses taken at prior colleges and prior learning.

Rationale:
This new language now excludes certificate graduates given that their degree does not include the same number of credits (generally half) of the associate degree as well as...

Revision: To clarify the statute of limitations policy regarding the time elapsed since the course at issue was taken, the academic achievement necessary for the policy to be invoked, and the student action necessary to be considered for the policy.

Current Policy

4.7 Statute of limitations

- a. A student may appeal to the CAS for the removal, in the computation of the grade point average (GPA), of a grade received in a course taken more than seven years prior to the appeal, provided the student has not been awarded a degree from the College.
- b. Removal of a grade from the computation of GPA shall not be an automatic procedure. The student shall be required to have exhibited significant academic achievement subsequent to the semester in which the grade was received.
- Removal of a grade from the computation of the GPA does not constitute removal of the record of the course and grade from the student transcript
- d. In the event a grade is removed from the computation of the GPA, the student shall be informed by the CAS that should the student transfer to another college, the receiving institution reserves the right to retain the grade in question.
- Should the CAS grant the appeal, a notation that the grade is non-credit and nonindexible will be appended to the original grade.
- f. Courses which have been granted the status of "non-credit, non-indexible" cannot be counted toward meeting the requirements for the degree.
- g. The appeal must be entertained by the CAS prior to the graduation meeting of the CAS. It must be initiated no later than the semester in which the student would be eligible to graduate, were the appeal to be granted.

Proposed Policy

4.7 Statute of limitations

- a. A student may appeal to the CAS for the removal, in the computation of the grade point average (GPA), of a grade received in a course taken <u>at least</u> seven years prior to the appeal, provided the student has not been awarded a degree from the College.
- To remove the grade, the student must pass an equal number of credits with a C or better, at least seven years later.
- c. Removal of a grade from the computation of GPA shall not be an automatic procedure. <u>Students must apply for the appeal by</u> <u>submitting a personal statement and a</u> <u>transcript as well as submit the appeal form.</u>
- d. Removal of a grade from the computation of the GPA does not constitute removal of the record of the course and grade from the student transcript.
- e. In the event a grade is removed from the computation of the GPA, the student shall be informed by the CAS that should the student transfer to another college, the receiving institution reserves the right to retain the grade in question.
- f. Should the CAS grant the appeal, a notation that the grade is non-credit and nonindexible will be appended to the original grade.
- g. Courses which have been granted the status of "non-credit, non-indexible" cannot be counted toward meeting the requirements for the degree.
- h. The appeal must be entertained by the CAS prior to the graduation meeting of the CAS. It must be initiated no later than the semester in which the student would be eligible to graduate, were the appeal to be granted.

<u>Rationale:</u> The updated language will reduce confusion in application of the statute of limitations policy by specifying key aspects of the policy more explicitly.

Revision: To modify the valedictorian and salutatorian codified policy to address issues that have arisen through the 2023 selection process, including the following: excluding certificate students for valedictorian/salutatorian, considering students with an outstanding summer course for valedictorian/salutatorian, excluding credit for prior learning scores in the valedictorian/salutatorian selection index, and requiring selected students to accept the valedictorian/salutatorian designation.

Proposed Policy

11.7 Graduation Honors

a. It is generally recognized that the academic honor of valedictorian or salutatorian is reserved to students who have accomplished the highest academic achievements in their graduating class. (For the purpose of this academic honor, the "graduating class" is understood to be those eligible to participate in the Commencement Ceremony, which includes students whose degrees were conferred in the preceding summer, fall, and winter. It also includes students eligible for spring conferral, conditional on completion of courses in progress, as well as students who are registered in the upcoming summer session in the one course needed to graduate.)

The college commencement committee shall be responsible for the selection of the valedictorian and salutatorian from the graduating class associate degree students. Students who are selected must choose to accept the honor within one week of official notification; failure to do so will result in a new selection by the committee.

b. In making their selections the committee shall follow the following criteria and process:

- i. The valedictorian and salutatorian shall be those students having the highest and next highest academic index among those graduating with an associate degree.
- ii. Calculation of the academic index for such determination

Rationale:

The policy changes proposed are justified as follows:

- Certificate students will no longer be considered for valedictorian/salutatorian, as they typically complete far fewer credits than associate degree students.
- Students with one outstanding summer course will be considered for valedictorian/salutatorian, as they are traditionally included in the Commencement Ceremony.
- Grades for credit for prior learning (e.g., AP Exams) are excluded from calculation of the valedictorian/salutatorian selection index, as they are really scores and not college grades.
- Students selected as valedictorian/salutatorian must accept the honor, as this will ensure that if a selected student is unreachable/unwilling, then another student will be chosen.
